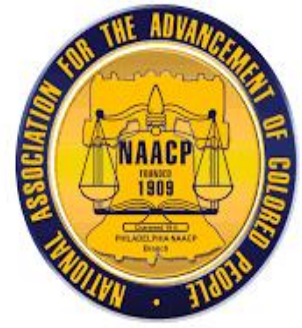

A Call To Action For 2017

The new leadership team for the Philadelphia Branch, NAACP was sworn into office on Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, Sunday, January 15, 2017 at Mt. Airy Church of God In Christ, where Rev. J. Louis Felton is the Pastor. Minister Rodney Muhammad was reelected in November of 2016, as President, along with First Vice President Felton, 2nd VP Joey Temple, (appointed), 3rd VP Felicia Harris, (new), Rochelle Bilal, Secretary and Shirley Jordan, Treasurer. After the oath of office was administered by President Judge Skinner, Minister Rodney shared with guests and members, the work to be done in 2017. " One of the main issues on the agenda is addressing Literacy in the African American community and in the Hispanic community. To have individuals reach adulthood with little or no literacy skills, Muhammad said, is inexcusable. The plan is to work

collaborating with colleges and universities and other education groups. We will continue to fight against House Bill 1538 which conceals police officers identity until that individual is convicted of a crime.

Everything You Want To Know About The National NAACP Convention July 22, 2017– July 26, 2017 In Baltimore, Maryland

The National NAACP annual conferences is an event you want to mark on your calendar now, as a “save the date” event.

The 108th national conference will unfold this year in Baltimore, Maryland, July 22—July 26, 2017 and is sure to be one of the most powerful, thought evoking and action taking gatherings we’ve seen in many years. Due to the climate in America what with the 45th President of the United States having taken the oath of office January 20th, it is a new day in America.

The NAACP is more important now than ever and it is equally important that everyone who is a card carrying member of the NAACP in good standing, to be more active and supportive of the goals and mission of the NAACP.

While this year marks the 108th National NAACP convention, it also marks the 48th annual Commerce and Industry Show, where corporate government, minority and non-profit exhibitors display their products and services is one of the highlights of the annual convention. It will begin on Saturday, July 22nd and concludes Tuesday, July 25th. Over 5,000 visitors are expected at this year’s Show and Job Fair during the 2017 Convention in Baltimore.

What is the purpose of the National Convention? The Annual Convention of the Association shall establish policies and programs of action for the ensuing year, all actions of the Convention on

Officers and all units, except as hereafter provided. No resolution for change of policy or program of action shall be in order, unless it shall have been favorably voted upon at regular legislative meetings of a unit in good standing, or has been submitted by the President and CEO. The resolution for policy or program change must be certified by the President and Secretary of the unit, and received by the President and CEO in the National Office by May 1st annually. The Convention shall act on all such proposed program or policy changes during the Legislative Sessions.

Here’s a couple things to note: The annual career and diversity fair will take place Tuesday, July 25th, 12pm-6pm. There will also be a health fair during the Commerce and Industry Show. There will be an Author’s Pavilion, a Retail Expo with lots of wonderful vendors and a Mobile Lounge.

Don’t forget our Act-So students will be performing and competing during the National Convention as well. Admission to the Commerce and Industry Show is free and open to the public. Cornell Williams Brooks is the 18th President and CEO of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). As a civil rights attorney, social justice advocate, fourth generation ordained minister and coalition builder, Brooks exemplifies the mission of the NAACP to secure political, educational, social and economic equality for all American citizens. Working with the whole of the NAACP, his vision is an NAACP that is multiracial, multiethnic, multigenerational and millions of members strong.

A graduate of Yale Law School, Brooks considers himself “an heir” of the Brown v. Board of Education decision. Born in El Paso, TX, and raised in Georgetown, SC, he went on to earn a B.A. with honors in political science from Jackson State University, a Masters of Divinity from Boston University School of Theology, where he was a Martin Luther King, Jr. Scholar, and a J.D. from Yale Law School. During his tenure as president and CEO of the NAACP, with renewed visibility and voice, Brooks has passionately led the Association in courts, and the community, against racial profiling, police misconduct and the full range of the NAACP’s

The service actually took place, immediately following the swearing-in of officers and board members of the Philly Branch. Rev. Felton, the pastor of the church and 1st Vice President of the NAACP, welcomed all members and guests to participate in both special occasions, the swearing-in of officers and the celebration of Dr. King.

Rev. Janet Jenkins Sturdivant was the keynote speaker for the Dr. King service and she delivered a rousing sermon about the legacy of Dr. King and the labor we yet have to accomplish today. Rev. Sturdivant was promoted to the office of Presiding Elder of the South District of the Philadelphia Annual Conference by the Presiding Prelate of the First Episcopal District, in 2013. Her appointment as Presiding Elder made Connectional history because her appointment makes it the first time that any Annual Conference in the African Methodist Episcopal Church has two female Presiding Elders serving in it, at the same time.

Philly Was Strong At NAACP State Conference

More than 25 Philadelphia NAACP members traveled to Millersville University Saturday, January 28, 2017 for the first quarterly NAACP State meeting. The main focus was a mandatory training for all officers and board members. The training was presided over by Paula Brown Edmond, who shared the NAACP history, many of our rules that are in our bylaws, the charge to work harder than ever for the NAACP, and a reminder to all if there's any "tensions"

NAACP MARCHED. WHEN TRUMP CAME TO TOWN

Thursday, January 26, 2017, as part of responding to actions taken by President Donald Trump to roll back the Affordable Care Act, (Obama Care Health Insurance), pushing for U.S. Senator Jeff Sessions to be the U.S. Attorney General, and to send a message to the White House that the NAACP is not going to sit by quietly and say nothing as Trump dismantles a lot of the great work accomplished by President Barack Obama, Rodney Muhammad and other NAACP members, participated in a demonstration against Trump.

The rally was across from City Hall outside in front of the Municipal Services Building. 5,000 people showed up for the march, even though it had only been organized in less than 24 hours. Rodney Muhammad was one of the leaders at the table, who helped strategize and put the rally and march together.

Participants marched until stopped by police a block away from the Lowes Hotel where Donald Trump was speaking. Minister Muhammad reminded us that our National NAACP President, Cornell Williams Brooks, along with 5 other NAACP leaders were arrested earlier in January, in Mobile Alabama at the senate office of Jeff Sessions, urging his name to be withdrawn for consideration as U.S. Attorney General. According to Rodney Muhammad, "If our national president can get arrested, the least we can do is rally and march."



Who is responsible for building collapse?

It's been found that the Salvation Army bears 75% of the responsibility for the 22nd & Market St. building collapse. Richard Basciano, real estate developer deserves 5% of the blame, his STB Investment Corporation, 13% of the blame, Plato Marinkos, Jr. the architect on the job, 30% — and again, the two African American men who were working on the job site that day, were found to only deserve 1% of the blame, but they're both in jail and all others involved are free at this time. Philly NAACP Stands Behind Griffin Campbell

Thursday February 2, 2017, The Philadelphia Branch NAACP held a press conference on the 4th floor at city hall to announce our continued concern that Griffin Campbell is sitting in prison, facing a 30 year sentence, when it was the owner of the building that collapsed on June 5, 2013, and the architect and developer, who were clearly far more responsible for the collapse of that building and the 7 lives lost who were inside at the time. Very the beginning of this sad story, it appeared that the two Black men involved with the case, became the scapegoats, while the whites involved, remained free. After the civil trial concluded, it was announced by the court, that Griffin Campbell and Sean Benschop were found to be only one percent responsible for the building collapse.

Rodney Muhammad is calling for a new trial for Griffin Campbell and the NAACP continues to stand by his wife, who participated
